

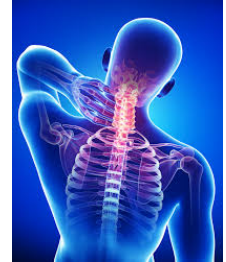

The module comprises

- a prereading component of 4 to 6 hours in preparation for a day-long workshop of interactive tutorials, hands on physical examination and treatment techniques with feedback, case discussions and mini-lectures.
